Implementation

- Training focusing on *illegal wildlife trade (Especially ivory trade) and its consequences* has been given to <u>110 participants</u> drawn from the Federal Police Crime Investigation Division, Ministry of Justice (Judiciaries and prosecutors), Revenue and Customs Authority. The training was held in Addis Ababa at the Federal Police Crime Investigation Division compound from 8-9 May 2014. (see Fig 3)
- Training focusing on how to identify wildlife products such as identifying elephant ivory and rhino horns has been given to 141 law enforcement officers working in the Ethiopian Revenue and Customs Authority and Federal Police Commission. The training has been carried out at 12 working sites (customs checking points located in the southern part of the country). (see Fig 4)
- Collect elephant ivory confiscated from illegal traffickers via an organized and integrated effort of federal police, community and wildlife officers at the Omo-Kuraze Sugar Development Project site, located in the Southern part of the country, near Omo National Park. (see Fig 5)
- Intelligence data generated from three sites, concerning poaching, illegal ivory and other elephant products trade and trafficking. The two sites are Gijiga and Dire Dawa, both located in the eastern part of the country and are among the most suspected areas for illegal trade and trafficking in elephant ivory and other wildlife. Both sites have a direct link to one of the elephant range areas in Ethiopia i.e. the Babile Elephant Sanctuary. Awash National Park area is the third sites where intelligence data has been collected.
- Conducted regular monitoring and follow up at Bole International Airport, targeting to increase detection of ivory trafficking via the airport and provided professional support to law enforcement officers (customs & federal police) working in the airport on how to identify raw and curved elephant ivory.





A team comprising one willdlife experts and two federal police crime investigators are now on duty in the northern part of the country, gatheribng inteleginece information associatted with illegal trafficking of wildlife and wildlife products.

Categories of activity

Activities to be done by the project

Planning

 Production of promotional video materials for Television and International Air ports, focusing on illegal wildlife trade and trafficking and poaching as well will be done.

Implementation

Awareness rising for journalists (communication officers) drawn from both government and non-government medias in the presence of representatives of our key stakholders will be conducted soon.





- Intelligence data generation regarding illegal ivory trade and trafficking will be carried on in the remaining **three sites**, found in the southern and eastern part of the country.
- Training to law enforcement agencies found around elephant range areas in the country will be conducted to enhance the implementation of wildlife laws in the areas.
- Training on identification will be given for law enforcement officers working at exit and entry points to increase detection of contraband in wildlife and their products.
